
I am **lesha Brown** a single mother from Staten Island. Mildred Elley is a wonderful College. The teachers are supportive and they know how to give you a push when you need it. I always manifest my future. I write down what I want and then I visualize getting it. When I graduated with my Medial Assisting A.O.S. Degree, I worked with Lisa Rini in Career Services. I was so nervous about interviewing. Lisa worked with me. We role played, tightened up my resume, and practiced, practiced, practiced. By the time I went out on interviews, I was confident. Next thing you know I landed a job at Mount Sinai. I was hired in the middle of a pandemic. The job was good but it was far from where I live and I wanted to make more money. I wrote down on a piece of paper my dream job and dream salary. I kept picturing myself at NYU Langone.

Mildred Elley offers lifetime Career Services, so even though I was graduated and working, I contacted Lisa again. She was happy to hear from me and immediately set me up with an interview at NYU. Because of COVID, the first interview was virtual. Lisa gave me pointers on how to ace a virtual interview. When the day came, I was relaxed. The actual interview was like a conversation with a friend.



Charles Roberts was born in Liberia in 1967. The country had an internal conflict that lasted from 1989 to 1997 killing about 250,000 people. Charles wanted his wife and five children to be safe, so they went to the Ivory Coast for a year and a half and then spent four and a half years living as refugees in Ghana. Charles never lost hope that things would improve. Through a friend, he and his family made their way to America. "My family and I all survived the war and made it to safety. I am so grateful. Once we were in America, one of my children wanted to get into nursing and she encouraged me to come to Mildred Elley with her. She said 'Dad, you always said you wanted an education.' She convinced me to come. The funny thing is, one day she disappeared from the college. I went home and told her you have to come back to school. You must come back. People look at us and they are so envious that a man gets to go to college with his daughter. They say look! They are both getting an education. However, the time was not right for my daughter. She had a child and she needed to work. She never came back. I never gave up. I had my setbacks. I did not get into the LPN program, but I kept going. I realized there were other careers in the medical field. I realized if I left it would be a shame on me. I continued to go to school to show my children that if I can do it, they can do it. I may look older, but my brain is fresh. I can learn. Now I have my degree! I can do what I want and I impressed my children. Some try, but they cannot make it.

"My advice to those of you who are sitting home and do not go to school – you can make it if you focus. Just try and go back to school."
